

SIDEWALK STORIES

(1989) 98 minutes, written/produced/ directed by Charles Lane, starring Charles LANE, Nicole ALYSIA, Sandye WILSON, Darnell WILLIAMS, Trula HOOSIER, original music by Marc MARDER, photography by Bill DILL

On a wintry Greenwich Village street, portrait artist Charles Lane (the writer/director himself) battles a bullying, giant fellow artist, strokes attractive businesswoman Sandye Wilson's cheek a little more than needed to get those proportions right, then gets stuck with adorable tot Nicole Alysia when her gambler dad gets knifed — all in black and white silence... and without the use of a single intertitle. An homage to Chaplin's *The Kid* (and other movies) set in a then-tough Village environment (Lane squats in a wreck slated for demolition) and clearly capturing the plight of the homeless, *Sidewalk Stories* retains a magical sense of the fable, until a final, startling switch to... Winner of the Prix du Public at the Cannes Film Festival, where it received a 15-minute ovation, *Sidewalk Stories* became a hit independent film around the world, but then disappeared: It's never been on DVD or home video. Approx. 97 min. DCP, restored by Cineteca di Bologna at L'Immagine Ritrovata and released by Carlotta Films US.

American filmmaker **CHARLES LANE** will be honored with the Bassel Shehade Award for Social Justice sponsored by Laila and Edward Audi in memory of Bassel Shehade. Bassel was a Syracuse University graduate film student from Syria, killed in Syria on May 28, 2012, while documenting and teaching civilian videographers to record the events occurring in their country for the world to see.

Charles Lane is an African-American actor and filmmaker. He is a native New Yorker. The son of a mail clerk and a cleaning woman, Charles Lane grew up in the public housing projects of New York City's South Bronx. He discovered his calling as a child, he told *Premiere*, when he "started watching films, mostly on TV." By the time he was in junior high, Lane was already writing scripts; by high school he had made his first film—a spy spoof-with a Super-8 camera his father had given him for Christmas. In 1973 Lane enrolled at the State University of New York at Purchase, where he became a full-time student of film. While attending SUNY Purchase as a film student, he made a short titled *A Place In Time* based on the famous Kitty Genovese incident. This short gained him a certain amount of attention, including a Student Academy Award win (1976).

Lane is recipient of a Rockefeller Foundation grant (1979). Other accolades include: Prix du Public, Cannes Film Festival, 1989; Don Quijote Seria, 1989, San Sebastian Film Festival; best film and best director awards, Sweden Film Festival at Uppsala, 1989; Guggenheim Award, 1990; best director award and public prize, Festival of Comedy at Vevey, Switzerland, 1990; first prize for best film, Wurzburg Film Festival, Germany, 1990; grand prize and critics prize, International Festival of Humor, Chamrousse, France, 1990; CEBA award, Pioneer of Excellence, 1991; NAACP award, 1992, for *Sidewalk Stories*

Inducted into the Black Filmmakers Hall Of Fame, 1990.

In January 2005, celebrating their 10th anniversary, the École et Cinéma program in association with France's Centre national du cinéma et l'image animée (CNC, Ministry of Culture) bestowed a prestigious honor upon Sidewalk Stories. It was selected to join the company of international cinematic classics such as The Wizard of Oz, The Bicycle Thief, Life Is Beautiful, Citizen Kane, The Red Shoes, Singin' In The Rain, The Red Balloon, and others... These films currently screen in theaters throughout the country, every semester throughout perpetuity, for the education of French school children (ages 6-13) to introduce to them films which mark the history of world cinema.

Lane is now working on *Resurrection Man* and *Lady Be Good*. Lane's other feature films include: *Sidewalk Stories* (1989), *True Identity* (1991), *Alma's Rainbow* (1998), *Posse* (1993), *Hallelujah* (1993), *The Mind* (2009).



Cassavetes was born in New York City, the son of actress Gena Rowlands and Greek-American actor and film director John Cassavetes. As a child, he appeared in two of his father's films: *Husbands* (1970) and *A Woman Under the Influence* (1974). After spending so much of his youth surrounded by the

film industry, Cassavetes initially decided he did not want to go into the field. He instead attended Syracuse University on a basketball scholarship. His athletic career was effectively ended by an injury, and he decided to rethink his aspirations, ultimately deciding to attend his parents' alma mater, the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York.

He has appeared in the films Face/Off, The Wraith, Life, Class of 1999 II: The Substitute, Backstreet Dreams and The Astronaut's Wife, among others. In addition to the three films the Syracuse International Film Festival will feature in honoring him, Unhook the Stars (1996), She's So Lovely (1997), and Yellow (2013) he has also directed John Q (2002) starring, Denzel Washington, Robert Duvall, and Gabriela Oltean; The Notebook (2004) starring, Gena Rowlands, James Garner and Rachel Adms; Alpha Dog (2006) starring, Emile Hirsch, Justin Timberlake, and Anton Yelchin; and My Sister's Keeper (2009) starring, Cameron Diaz, Abigail Breslin, and Alec Baldwin. In 2014 he directed The Other Woman starring Cameron Diaz, Leslie Mann, and Kate Upton. Cassavetes' films have won numerous awards. Cassavetes also adapted the screenplay for Blow and wrote the dialogue for the Justin Timberlake music video "What Goes Around... Comes Around."

This is the first of three programs honoring writer/director/actor Nick Cassavetes.

UNHOOK THE STARS (1996) 103 minutes by Nick Cassavetes, starring Gena Rowlands, Marisa Tomei, and Gerard Depardieu

Rowlands and Tomei both received SAG Award nominations for their performances. Filmed in the Sugarhouse neighborhood of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Rowlands plays Mildred, an older woman whose troubled daughter, Annie (Moira Kelly), has just left home. Shortly after Annie leaves, Mildred befriends Monica (Tomei), a single mother from across the street, and Mildred eventually finds herself baby sitter of Monica's young son, J. J. (Jake Lloyd). Throughout the film, Monica and J. J. inadvertently teach Mildred valuable life lessons about herself and her relationships with others.

The film's title refers to a song of the same name by Cyndi Lauper, which can be heard over the closing credits.

ROB DEEMER COMPOSES AN ORIGINAL SCORE FOR HAROLD LLOYD'S SAFETY LAST (1923)

Safety Last (1923), 73 minutes, directed by Fred C. Newmeyer and Sam Taylor

A romantic comedy silent film starring Harold Lloyd. It includes one of the most famous images from the silent film era: Lloyd clutching the hands of a large clock as he dangles from the outside of a skyscraper above moving traffic. The film was highly successful and critically hailed, and it cemented Lloyd's status as a major figure in early motion pictures. It is still popular at revivals, and it is viewed today as one of the great film comedies.

After Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton, the silent film era's "third genius" was Harold Lloyd, who stars in this Horatio Alger-style story of an average country boy trying to make good in the big city. The Boy (Lloyd) leaves his sweetheart, The Girl (Mildred Davis, later the real-life Mrs. Lloyd) in Great Bend while he pursues his fortune in a teeming metropolis. The Boy lands a job as a clerk at a fabric counter of DeVore's, a huge department store, but he lies in his letters home to his beloved, pretending to be the store's manager and spending his earnings on lavish gifts. The Boy's roommate, The Pal (Bill Strother) makes money as a "human fly," performing attention-getting stunts. Promised \$1,000 by DeVore's real manager if he can devise a publicity gimmick, The Boy convinces his friend to climb the 12-story establishment and split the winnings

with him. On the day of the event, however, The Pal is busy dodging The Law (Noah Young), forcing The Boy to make the arduous climb solo. Dodging a variety of obstacles, The Boy climbs higher and higher, eventually dangling from the store's clock tower, in the film's most memorable image. — Karl Williams, Rovi

Rob Deemer is a composer, educator, author, and arts advocate. His works have been performed by the President's Own Marine Band, Chicago Composers Orchestra, cellist Jeffrey Ziegler, soprano Tony Arnold,

saxophonist Tim McAllister, the Great Noise Ensemble, Society for New Music, and the Rascher Saxophone Quartet. He is well-known for his writings on *New Music Box, Sequenza21*, and the *New York Times*. Deemer is currently head of composition at the State University of New York at Fredonia and a member of the composition faculty at the Interlochen Summer Arts Camp.

In 1993 Deemer was named the College Winner of the DownBeat Magazine Student Music Award for "Best Extended Composition." Since then, his career has taken him and his works from jazz clubs in Chicago, stage shows on a Caribbean cruise liner, and film scoring studios in Los Angeles to concert halls, theatrical stages, and film festivals across the country and around the world.

In addition to his work in concert music, Rob has extensive experience as a composer for film, theater, and dance. With over 30 films and documentaries to his credit, his film scores have been heard in the Cannes Film festival, Directors Guilds of America in both Los Angeles and New York, the Festival CineLatino in San Francisco, the Festivale Pan African du Cinema in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso, and festivals in Chicago, Austin, San Antonio, Las Vegas, and San Diego. As an author, he has co-authored *Hearing the Movies: Music and Sound in Film History* (OUP) with noted film scholars David Neumeyer and James Buhler. His work as theatrical composer and sound



designer has been produced at the Mark Taper New Works Festival, the California Institute of the Arts, and the Skylight and Crown Theatres in Los Angeles, and he has worked with such directors as Lisa Peterson, Philip Goodwin, Chris Fields, and Tony Abettamarco. Rob teamed up with choreographer David Justin to create the American Repertory Ensemble, a radical new performing ensemble that creates unique chamber music and dance experiences 'and has given critically acclaimed performances in Austin, Texas, and Edinburgh, Scotland.

Mabel's Strange Predicament

(1914) 10 minutes, directed by Mabel Normand, is notable for being the first film for which Chaplin donned The Tramp costume.

In a hotel lobby a heavily drunken tramp runs into an elegant lady, Mabel, gets tied up in her dog's leash, and falls down. He later runs into her in the hotel corridor, locked out of her room. They

run through various rooms. Mabel ends up in the room of an elderly husband, where she hides under the bed. Enter the jealous wife, who soon attacks Mabel, her husband, and Mabel's lover, not to mention the staggeringly drunken tramp. *Mabel's Strange Predicament* is one of more than a dozen early films that writer/director/comedienne Mabel Normand made with Chaplin; Normand, who had written and directed films before Chaplin, mentored the young comedian.

Nathalie Khoriaty is a singer-songwriter whose love for music and song has filled her life with passion and dedication. Her clear and honest voice, combined with her creativity and songwriting, are some of the qualities that define Nathalie as a musician. Her love for life and people inspires her to express the stories of her life and to share the joys and sorrows of her heart. As a genuine performer, she captures and touches people's hearts and reaches her audiences with her warmth and reflections.

Nathalie began private piano lessons at the age of 5 and was awarded prizes from many classical festivals and music competitions throughout her classical career. At the age of 15, she discovered a deep interest in singing and songwriting and since then has embarked on an exciting journey which has led her to many wonderful places. Her passion fills her mind, her heart, and her soul, and her humanistic side is only a part of what she portrays in her music. *Mississippi Love*, her first album, is a clear indication of her ability to incorporate her life experiences and those of the people she meets and loves into her music.

Nathalie's music is an expression of love and life.





MADE IN SYRACUSE: U.S. PREMIERE: IS THAT YOU? BY DANI MENKIN

IS THAT YOU? stars Alon Abouboul (Batman - The Dark Night Rises, Munich, Homeland, NCIS-A, Burn Notice), and Naruna De Macedo Kaplan (Je T'aime, I Love You Terminal), had its world premiere at the Montreal World Film Festival, and has been nominated as best feature film for the Israeli Academy Award (Ophir).

IS THAT YOU? (2015) 84 minutes, directed by Dani Menkin is the story of Ronnie, a 60-year-old Israeli film projectionist, who after being fired from his job decides to travel to the United States to search for the love of his youth, Rachel. Ronnie has a rather awkward reunion with his brother, Jacob, (a car dealer) and nephew who try to help locate Rachel. Having discovered an address, Ronnie takes off on the road with one of his brother's used cars. Of course, as with most used cars, Ronnie's breaks down. A young woman, Myla, with camera in hand and tripod draped over her shoulder, stops to help. This begins the relationship between Ronnie and Myla and the ensuing road trip. Myla is a film student making a documentary about "The Road Not Taken" asking people to speak about their regrets. Myla agrees to help Ronnie on his search for Rachel in return for being allowed to document his quest. On the road Ronnie and Myla discover that Rachel is not to be found as easily as they thought.

DANI MENKIN has been a lecturer and juror at international festivals around the world and has taught film at universities and colleges in Israel and the United States. In 2014 he was a mentor at the International Filmmaking Academy, founded by famed writer/producer/director Gian Vittorio Baldi, in Bologna, Italy.

In the spring of 2012 Dani, a Schusterman Foundation recipient, taught as a visiting artist in the film program in the Department of Transmedia, College of Visual and Performing Arts, Syracuse University. During this time he organized the pre-production for *Is That You?* with over 40 students

and faculty from the College of Visual and Performing Arts film program, and the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications, who took part in the production as crew, production staff, and actors. Other professional Syracusans also participated in key production and acting roles. The film was shot in June 2012 in Syracuse. There were a few scenes filmed in Tel-Aviv, Israel.

Menkin's other works include the award-winning films *Dolphin Boy* (2011), *Je T'aime, I Love You Terminal* (2010), and *39 Pounds of Love* (2005), all of which have been screened in the Syracuse International Film Festival. The festival made a "captioned" copy of *39 Pounds of Love* for a screening that took place at the United Nations. *Dolphin Boy*, special prize winner at the Jerusalem Film Festival (2011) and nominee for an Israeli Academy Award, has been acquired by Disney to be made into a feature film. *Je T'aime, I Love You Terminal* won Best Feature Film at the Houston International Film Festival.





HONORING, SALLY KIRKLAND

Presented by: Syracuse University College of Visual and Performing Arts and S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications



SALLY KIRKLAND is a film, TV, and theater veteran since the 1960s and is probably best known for the film Anna, for which she garnered a Best Actress Oscar nomination and won the Best Actress Golden Globe, the Independent Spirit Award, and the LA Film Critic's Circle Award. Sally's first director was Andy Warhol in 1964's 13 Most Beautiful Women. Her 120 films also include The Sting, The Way We Were, Coming Apart, Cold Feet, Best of the Best, Revenge, JFK, Ed TV, Bruce Almighty, and Coffee Date. Her newest film, Archaeology of a Woman, made its New York theatrical premiere in September 2014. 

It was a low-budget indie drama - that was propelled by Kirkland's chutzpah campaign. Indie screen legend Gena Rowlands told Sally, "I voted for you because of vour campaign alone." The Los Angeles Times called Kirkland in Anna "one of the five best performances by an actress in the 1980s." There was no studio involved - and it went head-to-head with Moonstruck. Fatal Attraction and Broadcast News. Before Anna. Kirkland





had worked for decades as a lesser-known character actress in film, TV, and theater. MADHUR BHANDARKAR (Born on August 26, 1966) is a four-time National Award-winning Indian film director, producer, and scriptwriter best known for making hard-hitting realistic cinema. He has been written about many times as the Indian answer to Hollywood filmmaker Quentin Tarantino. Bhandarkar's fascination for cinema began when he was a kid. At the age of 16 years, Bhandarkar ran a videocassette library in Khar, a suburb of Mumbai, India, and delivered cassettes door-to-door. This gave him access to a large collection of movies and he studied filmmaking through it.


He made his directorial debut with the movie *Trishakti* in 1999. However, Bhandarkar wanted to make a different kind of film. *Chandani Bar* (2001) was the beginning of his new approach and aesthetic. The film starring Tabu and Atul Kulkarni won a National Award for best film on social issues. The film's critical and commercial success took Bhandarkar into the top league of filmmakers in Indian film industry and then there was no looking back for him.

After *Chandani Bar* won a National Award, Bhandarkar made *Satta*, starring Raveena Tandon, which was followed by *Page 3*, starring Konkona Sensharma. His next film, *Corporate*, exposed the dark side of business world, and *Traffic Signal* was based on the lives of the people living below the poverty line who earn their living at the traffic signals in India. *Fashion* (2008) was followed by *Jail* (2009) aka *Neil Nitin Mukesh*, a film about a man framed for a crime he did not commit. All of Bhandarkar's films were applauded by critics and achieved commercial success. In 2011 he made his first romantic comedy, *Dil Toh Baccha Hai Ji*. His last release was *Heroine* (2012)

Among his many accolades Madhur was awarded the Best Director for his Outstanding Contribution to Indian Cinema by the Ministry of Culture, Russia. Under the section "Tribute to India," a retrospective of five films made by the acclaimed film-maker were showcased at the 33rd Cairo International Film Festival in Egypt.

HEROINE (2012) 140 minutes, directed by Madhur Bhandarkar, starring Kareena Kapoor, Arjun Rampal, and Randeep Hooda

Heroine showcases the life of a superstar diva, revealing the unseen facets of celluloid stardom. Mahi Arora (Kareena Kapoor) is a star at the top of her game. It is her involvement with a married superstar Aryan (Arjun Rampal) that causes her career to take a nosedive. As her love life shatters, Mahi's professional engagement stars to suffer. Her impulsive and moody behavior results in losing roles to upcoming actresses and her brand endorsements start to fall as well. A no-nonsense PR person teams up with Mahi to resurrect her career. But each move seems to bring its own complications. Her journey is lonely, and even when she falls in love with a cricketer the relationship hits rock-bottom, pushing Mahi into deeper depression and desperation.

SHE'S SO LOVELY (1997), 100 minutes, by Nick Cassavetes, starring Sean Penn, Robin Wright Penn, John Travolta, James Gandolfini. Susan Travlor. and Harry Dean Stanton

Sean Penn won Best Actor Award at Cannes Film Festival and Nick Cassavetes was nominated for the Palme d'Or (1997). Robin Wright Penn was nominated for Outstanding Performance by a Female Actor in a leading Role for the Screen Actors Guild Awards (1998) and won Best Actress at the SESC Film Festival, Brazil (1999)

Eddie Quinn's unruly wife, Maureen, drinks and smokes to excess, even though she is pregnant. Eddie has troubles of his own, disappearing for days at a time. When she is physically and sexually assaulted by Kiefer, a neighbor, it is more than Eddie can handle. He shoots someone and lands in a psychiatric hospital. Ten years go by. Eddie finally returns, only to find Maureen is now a clean, sober, solid citizen, married to a new man, Joey, and a mother of three children, one of whom is Eddie's own daughter.



Eddie's return complicates and endangers all of their lives.

At the time of its release, *She's So Lovely* received special attention because, eight years after his death, it was the first (and still only) posthumous film to feature previously unreleased material from John Cassavetes. The film stars Sean Penn and John Travolta as the respective men who bid for the affection of Maureen Murphy Quinn (Robin Wright Penn). Harry Dean Stanton costars as a friend of Penn's character, and James Gandolfini plays the abusive neighbor.

She sees a psychiatrist for the disconnect daydreams she keeps having, and her younger sister with Tourette's syndrome hates her. And when she loses her job for sleeping with one of the fathers on parents night, she decides to go home. And that's when the fun really starts. The dreams which seemed so random now start to take real shape as we understand where she came from. 



SAM LLOYD is an American character actor and musician, perhaps best known for his portraval of beaten down lawver Ted Buckland on the American comedy-drama Scrubs. Lloyd attended Syracuse University. He is the nephew of Back to the Future star Christopher Lloyd, and his father is also an actor. He and Christopher Lloyd both guest starred on Malcolm in the Middle (2005), Sam as a housing lawyer and Christopher as Hal's father. The two also guest starred on The West Wing (1999-2002), with Sam requesting the White House to release information about UFOs and Christopher as a constitutional law expert. He also appears in *Desperate* Housewives (2004-05) as Albert Goldfine. Some of his other television credits include: The PET Squad Files (2013), The Middle (2012-13), Cougar Town (2011-12), Spin City (1998-2000), NYPD Blue (2000), and 3rd Rock From the Sun (1997-98). Sam's film credits include ExTerminators (2009) by John Inwood, Pants on Fire (2008) by Colin Campbell, the comedy Waking Up with Monsters (2007) by Cat Fobi, The Brothers Solomon (2007) by Bob Odenkirk, The Mudge Boy (2003) by Michael Burke, The Real Old Testament (2003) by Curtis and Paul Hannum, and Galaxy Quest (1999) by Dean Parisot, starring Tim Allen, Sigourney Weaver, and Alan Rickman, in which Sam played Neru. Sam also played in Flubber (1997) by Les Mayfield, starring Robin Williams. 
FIXING LUKA (2010) 11 minutes/animation, by Jessica Ashman (Scotland)



ANAND GANDHI'S film *Ship of Theseus* was cited when in April 2013, top critics from the Critics' Circle (UK) were invited to select and introduce a screening of "the film that changed their life" to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the organization. The list of 15 films, selected by the critics, included *400 Blows*, *Annie Hall, Raging Bull, The Battle of Algiers* and *Hamlet. Ship of Theseus* was the only film made in the last two decades on that list.

Anand Gandhi is a filmmaker, playwright, and artist, deeply interested in philosophy, evolutionary psychology, and science fiction. His work in theater, television, and short cinema has won him several prestigious awards in the past decade. Both his films *Continuum* (2006) and *Right Here Right Now* (2003) were screened in past Syracuse International Film Festivals

Ship of Theseus, his first feature, premiered at the Toronto International Film Festival, where it was touted "the hidden gem of the year." The film has received accolades the world over. Gandhi is now engaged in producing cutting-edge, contemporary world cinema under his banner Recyclewala Films.In addition to writing, directing, and producing his films, Gandhi illustrates, writes songs, plays chess, and attempts to invent new events as a magic enthusiast.

Once in a while comes a film like this one, which along with shaking your core, also manages to make you grateful for being a humble part of the audience. *Ship of Theseus* is one such rare film. (*Mid-day*, 2013)

Leaving aside the astounding artistry of Gandhi, *Ship of Theseus* is noteworthy in one other aspect: it has introduced to us an actor the likes of whom hasn't been seen in Indian cinema for decades – Sohum Shah. If the film deserves five stars, then this man deserves at least a constellation. Or better, let a constellation be named in his honour so other actors can look up and admire his brilliance from time to time. (*News Laundry, 2013*)

Sophisticated... Intelligent... Unexpected grandeur. The film demonstrates an assured grasp of philosophy as well as the intricacies of cinematic language. (Variety, 2013)

Contemplative and densely layered. Gandhi and cinematographer Pankaj Kumar's breathtaking visual poetry gives us a sense of Mumbai as an entity unto itself, further blurring the line between the individual and the environment. (*The Hollywood Reporter, 2013*)

SHIP OF THESEUS (2013) 140 minutes, by Anand Gandhi, starring Aida El-Kashef, Neeraj Kabi, and Sohum Shah

If the parts of a ship are replaced, bit by bit, is it still the same ship?

A blind photographer, celebrated for her intuitive work, successfully captures the essence of her experience in her photography. However, she also struggles with insecurities over authorship in the context of larger questions about subjectivity and intent in art.

An erudite monk, who is an ideologue and practitioner of nonviolence, and involved in animal rights activism, is forced to make a choice between death and medicine - medicine that is either derived from or tested on animals.

As death closes in, he requestions all the ideas that he has always taken for granted.

A young stockbroker has a frictional relationship with his grandmother, whom he nurses in a hospital. When it is discovered that a neighboring patient has had his kidney stolen, he starts out on a trail that leads him to a kidney tourism racket. Altruism and concern leads him to confront the recipient of the kidney, eventually making him discover how intricate morality could be.

Following the separate strands of their philosophical journeys, and their eventual convergence, *Ship of Theseus* explores questions of identity, justice, beauty, meaning, and death.

Is a wry comedy about a young couple who are about to have sex in a car when they realize the young man does not have a condom. At this same moment they notice a woman standing at the corner of an intersection not far from them.
