

THE PAPER STORE (2016) by NICHOLAS GRAY and KATHARINE CLARK GRAY,

99 minutes (USA)

The Paper Store is an award-winning film that tells the story of Annalee, an academic ghost writer who works in the shadows of a college campus. When Annalee is approached by student Sigurd to write his entire film studies degree, she initially has reservations but agrees to take up the challenge when Sigurd says he'll pay double. Soon, the pair begin an intense sexual relationship but things begin to turn sour when secrets start to spill and the classic boy-meetsgirl tale gets intelligently ugly.

Dark, witty, and intelligent, *The Paper Store* is a tale of romance and revenge set in academia.

The Paper Store is an adaptation of CNY native Katharine Clark Gray's acclaimed play 516 (five-sixteen), which was workshopped at the NY International Fringe Festival in 2007 and singled out as a must-see production, with four out of four stars on Time Out New York. The play received its professional debut through Philadelphia Theatre Workshop in 2010, and plans to adapt it to film began shortly thereafter.

Katharine and her husband, Nicholas Gray, were producing partners at A Chip & A Chair Films for eight years before branching off on their own with Uncompromised Creative. This new company partnered with Jonathan Gray (no relation) as Producer and production counsel (*Precious; Beasts of the Southern Wild; The Station Agent*), casting legend Bonnie Timmermann (*Heat, Bull Durham, Miami Vice,* and dozens more for Michael Mann, Ridley Scott, and Tony Scott), producer John Grossman of Front Wheel Productions, and co-executive Producers Actium Pictures to make *The Paper Store* into Uncompromised Creative's feature debut.

Max von Sydow and Laurence Leboeuf star in this beautiful and imaginative film. Everyone knows that dragons aren't real, but why do tales about them appear in cultures around the world? This movie traces their legends across cultures and continents, exploring their connections to history, geography, paleontology, literature, art, national identity, and more.

Meet Skye Ingram, a young woman who is suffering from recurring nightmares of dragons. For help, she turns to the peculiar Dr. Alistair Conis, a dragon expert. As they work to identify the source of Skye's inner turmoil, the pair discover they share an unusual bond.

Fafard studied film and theatre at Université Laval, graduating in 1985, then directed dozens of film and TV productions. From 1996 to 2000, he directed innovative documentary shorts in the United States, Canada, and France for two think tanks. He began filming large-format movies in 2002 with *Adrenaline Rush: The Science of Risk*. The film got a special jury mention at the Festival de la Géode in Paris and a "Best of Fest" at the Science Museum of Minnesota Film Festival.


Since 2005, Fafard has worked primarily on films for IMAX and Giant Screen Theaters, including *Dinosaurs: Giants of Patagonia*, which he wrote and directed. It was nominated in the category "Outstanding Effects for a Special Venue" at the prestigious Visual Effects Society Awards.



His most recent film was a feature 3D documentary, *The Wings of Johnny May*, depicting the heroic life of the first Inuit bush pilot and the tremendous social and environmental changes that his people have seen through the last half century. It premiered at the Cannes Film Market; closed the Montreal First Peoples Festival; and was nominated for Best Directorial Work (Jade Kunlun Award) at the Qinghai Festival in China and for Best Biographical Documentary and Best Documentary Screenplay at Gémeaux Awards in Canada.

CEMETERY OF SPLENDOR (2015) by **APICHATPONG WEERASETHAKUL**, 122 minutes (Thailand) Winner of Asian Pacific Screen Awards and Cannes Film Festival nominee.

Soldiers with a mysterious sleeping sickness are transferred to a temporary clinic in a former school. The memory-filled space becomes a revelatory world for housewife and volunteer Jenjira as she watches over ltt, a handsome soldier with no family visitors. Jen befriends young medium Keng, who uses her psychic powers to help loved ones communicate with the comatose men. Doctors explore ways to ease the men's troubled dreams. Jen discovers ltt's cryptic notebook of strange writings and blueprint sketches. There may be a connection between the soldiers' enigmatic syndrome and the mythic ancient site that lies beneath the clinic. Magic, healing, romance, and dreams are all part of Jen's tender path to a deeper awareness of herself and the world around her.

The word "unique" is sometimes overused, but in Weerasethakul's case, it applies. His films are personal, and what interests him is evident, but the way he decides to "put things together" is "sui generis." He is an artist who follows his own star with such devotion that his films feel like memories of a collective distant past, snatched from the surface of the subconscious, suggesting the iceberg below. His images have great and dreamy staying power.

Straddling the movement from the silent to sound era, Hitchcock began production as if creating a silent film. After beginning production, British International Pictures decided to convert *Blackmail* into a sound film during filming. A silent version was released for theaters not equipped for sound, with the sound version released at the same time. The silent version still exists in the British Film Institute collection.

During a date, Alice White (Anny Ondra) has a fight with her boyfriend, Scotland Yard Officer Frank Webber (John Longden), and decides to leave with an artist named Mr. Crewe (Cyril Ritchard). When they get to the artist's flat, Mr. Crewe attempts to force himself on Alice, and she kills him to defend herself. Frank investigates the case and, after realizing Alice is the culprit, seeks to help her. However, a thief (Donald Calthrop) with blackmail on his mind complicates matters

Festival guests will discuss the state of independent filmmaking, distribution, and financing with local filmmakers and film students.

This year's meeting of local filmmakers with international and national guests of the Syracuse International Film Festival will take place at the new Film Hub in the Collamer Crossings Business Park. The seminar will include a tour of the soundstage and other Film Hub facilities and an introduction to the new Film Hub manager, Huayu Xu.

Huayu Xu graduated with a B.A. in stage management from Hofstra University (1994), a M.B.A. in management from Murray State (1996), and an M.F.A. in film from Syracuse University (1999). From 1999-2002, he was IT manager for New York Future Media Concepts, Inc. He has been a production manager, writer, director, and professor in China since 2002, having produced several feature films and television series.

The Central New York Hub for Emerging Nano Industries (Film Hub) expands Governor Andrew Cuomo's proven public-private partnership economic development model to film and television production to attract and create highskill, high-wage jobs through innovation and private investment. In addition to traditional production and post-production capabilities, the hub will be a center of nanotechnology education, research and development, and workforce training that will make Central New York a leader in next-generation computer imagery, animation, and motion capture technology.

Leading the seminar will be Tom Bower, actor/producer and creator of the SAG Indie Outreach Program. Tom is also president of the festival's Honorary Board. Other participants include this year's SIFF's Lifelong Achievement Sophia Awardwinners documentary filmmaker Eugene Corr and Academy Award winning writer/director/actor Bobby Moresco. They will be joined by writer/director/actor Michael Olmos, producer Monica Levinson, writers/producers/directors Katherine



BEHIND THE WHITE GLASSES (2015) by **VALERIO RUIZ,** 84 minutes (Italy)

Behind The White Glasses is a musical portrait that shines a spotlight on unknown aspects of the creative, visionary, and groundbreaking talent of filmmaker and writer Lina Wertmüller, the first woman to receive an Oscar nomination for Best Director for her film Seven Beauties. Wertmüller is also known for The Seduction of Mimi, Love and Anarchy, and Swept Away, all groundbreaking films in the Italian cinema and all having had successful runs in American theaters.

From the unpublished pictures taken in Cinecittà when she was Federico Fellini's assistant director for 8 1/2, the documentary takes us to the places where her most famous films were set, revealing the artistic and human universe of a woman who, with her unfailing irony and taste for the grotesque, has left her mark in all fields entertainment in which she worked: cinema, drama, television, and music. The journey is accompanied by many exclusive interviews with the artists who witnessed her intense and constantly evolving career. Among them: Giancarlo Giannini, Marina Cicogna, Sophia Loren, and many foreign talents like Harvey Keitel, Nastassja Kinski, and film critic John Simon. The film features a long series of unreleased videos, images, and songs written by Lina Wertmüller. Behind The White Glasses is a personal poetic portrait by Valerio Ruiz, who was her assistant director and very close collaborator.

At age 88, Wertmüller remains active writing and directing.

Valerio Ruiz is a young Italian documentary filmmaker who worked with

Wertmuller on one of her recent films. His affection and admiration for her and
her work is evident in *Behind The White Glasses*.





The film is a tongue-in-cheek nod to Italian
Neo-Realism, shot in Rob Nilsson's Direct Action
style. A pickpocket cinema projectionist in
Bologna, Italy, narrates three intertwining stories
of tourists who visit his city one summer. A timid
adjunct professor from Australia receives word from

a mysterious stranger about his imminent death while nervously preparing to present his paper on the classic film *Last Year at Marienbad*. An apostate ex-priest gifts a naive and destitute young couple with a camcorder...for possibly lecherous purposes. And, lastly, the pickpocket projectionist narrator pursues his own adventure with a lovely but understandably cautious Icelandic girl.


Rob Nilsson is a Sundance and Cannes Film Festival award winner. He has directed more than 33 films and is the creator of the Direct Action style of digital filmmaking taught in the Tenderloin Group Actor's Ensemble, San Francisco, and featured in workshops conducted around the world. Nilsson is a pioneer in the techniques of video to film transfer, which led to today's digital revolution.

The International Filmmaking Academy is a unique filmmaking institution created by famed Italian producer and director Gian Vittorio Baldi. The IFA was formed by 16 graduate film programs representing 16 institutions from throughout the world. IFA Master Teachers have included Bernardo Bertolucci, Abbas Kiarostami, Claudia, Llosa, Danis Tanovic, Dani Menkin, Diao Yinan, Krzysztov Zanussi, and Ron Nilsson. 

Q&A with Mr. Moresco following screening

A man is forced to go against his family and his principles in the name of serving his country in this drama inspired by actual events. Tommy Santoro (James Marsden) was just a boy when his father was murdered, and young Tommy quickly discovered his dad was a high-ranking member of the Philadelphia Mafia. Tommy grew up determined to stay on the right side of the law, but his brother Vincent (Brad Renfro) and cousin Joey (Giovanni Ribisi)

BOBBY MORESCO is an Academy-Award winning writer, director, and producer who started out as an actor in New York City. His stage work includes writing and directing more than 30 plays Off and Off-Off Broadway and, fulfilling a childhood dream, he directed Colin Quinn in *An Irish Wake* at the Helen Hayes on Broadway.

Throughout the '90s, Moresco focused much of his time on creating, writing, and producing for television. Notable projects included the Genesis Award-winning *Millenium* and *EZ Streets* (1996), which won the "Viewers for Quality Television Award" for best program of the year, as well as being named one of the best television shows of all time as recently as 2008. In 1998, he cocreated and executive produced the critically acclaimed series *Falcone* and was nominated for two Emmy Awards.

Moresco co-wrote and produced the breakout film of 2004, the Oscar winner *Crash*. The film was directed by Paul Haggis stars an ensemble cast, including Don Cheadle, Matt Dillon, Sandra Bullock, Brendan Fraser, Ryan Phillipe, Thandie Newton, and Karina Arroyava. Moresco's other features include *Million Dollar Baby* (2005 Academy Award Winner for Best Picture), which he co-produced and developed with Paul Haggis, and *10th & Wolf*, his directorial debut starring James Marsden and Giovanni Ribisi.



had other ideas and ended up joining "the family business." Tommy enlisted in the Army and served in Operation Desert Storm, but when he impulsively stole a jeep, he was arrested by the military police. However, Tommy finds he's not questioned by MPs, but by Horvath (Brian Dennehy), an FBI agent who knows all about his past and family history. Horvath has learned that Sicilian mobsters have been taking over the Philly rackets and persuades Tommy to join up with Vincent and Joey in order to infiltrate the Mafia and serve as an informant to the FBI. Tommy grudgingly agrees, but he's uneasy about betraying his family and following the path that killed his father—especially when he discovers his actions have put Vincent and Joey in grave danger.

The Syracuse International Film Festival is honoring one of the greatest actresses to ever grace the silver screen, Sophia Loren, with a four-film retrospective. Her talents as an actress were not recognized until her performance as Cesira in Vittorio De Sica's *Two Women*, which earned her the Academy Award for Best Actress in 1962 and made her the first artist to win an Oscar for a foreign-language performance. She holds the record for having earned six David di Donatello Awards for Best Actress, the most ever received: *Two Women; Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow; Marriage Italian Style* (for which she was nominated for a second Oscar); *Sunflower; The Voyage;* and *A Special Day*. In later years, she has appeared in American films such as *Grumpier Old Men* and *Nine*. In addition

to the Academy Award, she has won a Grammy Award, five special Golden Globes, a BAFTA Award, a Laurel Award, the Best Actress Award at the Cannes Film Festival, and the Honorary Academy Award in 1991. In 1995, she received the Cecil B. DeMille Award for lifetime achievements, one of many such awards. In 1999, Loren was acknowledged as one of the top 25 female American Screen Legends in the American Film Institute's survey.

Famed Italian film poster artist Silvano
Campeggi created the SIFF logo based
on one of his paintings of Loren. So,
Loren's eyes are the eyes of the Syracuse SYRAC
International Film Festival.



YESTERDAY, TODAY and TOMORROW (1963) by VITTORIO DE SICA,

119 minutes (Italy)

Director Vittorio De Sica created this trilogy of romantic comedies set in different parts of Italy, with Sophia Loren and Marcello Mastroianni starring in each story. In Naples, poor Adelina supports her husband by selling black market cigarettes. In Milan, wealthy Anna is having an affair with poor Renzo, whose infatuation is tested by a near-tragedy. In Rome, prostitute Mara seeks the help of her client Augusto to spurn the advances of

her neighbor's infatuated

grandson (Giovanni

Ridolfi).





MARRIAGE ITALIAN STYLE (1964) by VITTORIO DE SICA,

102 minutes (Italy)

When handsome. successful Domenico (Marcello Mastroianni) first meets the sexy young waif Filomena (Sophia Loren) in Naples during World War II, he is instantly smitten. Flash forward to the postwar years, and the two meet again, sparking a passionate affair that spans two decades. Two-time Academy Award winner for *Harlan County, USA,* and *American Dream* Barbara Kopple's new documentary is about rhythm and blues performer Sharon Jones. The film explores that even though dreams never expire they sometimes must be deferred. The film follows the talented and gregarious soul singer of the Grammynominated R&B band "Sharon Jones and the Dap Kings." In the most challenging year of her life, Sharon Jones confronts pancreatic cancer. As she struggles to find her health and voice again, the film intimately uncovers the mind and spirit of a powerful woman determined to regain the explosive singing career that eluded her for 50 years.

Barbara Kopple's *Miss Sharon Jones!* tells the kind of true story that makes you want to kick creation itself square in the crotch. Here's that firecracker soul singer, nearing her sixties, her boogie still majestic, her band still a tight retro marvel, her wail still the southern end of a northbound dragster. When she's onstage, her Dap-Kings lock into a groove, her sweat flies, and, if you're in the crowd, you damn sure dance or you aren't worth knowing.

Yet the film's real success lies in having Jones as its primary subject, and that's because she's a wickedly funny, fierce, phenomenal force of nature, a positive, vivacious character whose generosity and charisma touches every single person. Despite the countless stresses she faces during her medical struggle Jones remains strong and positive, neutralizing the terror the cancer would normally cause in those around her, and inspiring them to stay strong. Each time one of the subjects is about to break into tears while being interviewed in the film, you can't help but see the positive difference Jones has made. As weepy as that sounds, the film never verges into sentimental territory, thanks to its perfectly paced moments of levity and positive energy, seen in small moments, like Jones' jubilant discovery that she has been invited to guest on *Ellen*, one of her favorite daytime TV shows, or her making fun of the wigs she's trying on early in her treatment process.

THE GOOD MIND (2015) by GWENDOLEN CATES, 70 minutes (USA)

The sovereign Onondaga Nation in central New York State is the Central Fire of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, which inspired American democracy. The Onondagas advocate for the environment while engaged in a battle with the U.S. government over ancestral lands stolen in defiance of a treaty with George Washington. SIFF Sophia Award winner Oren Lyons and others from the Onondaga Nation will participate in a post-screening discussion with the audience.

For the Onondaga Nation, it's all about relationships. Relationships with ancestors, relationships with governments, relationships with each other, and relationships with the natural world. Each of these is highlighted in *The Good Mind*.

"This film takes on the amazing task of showing how as a traditional Nation we still raise up our leaders in our traditional way while maintaining our responsibilities to Mother Earth and our communities, as we have done for over a thousand years, and how we have remained relevant in a modern world," observed Sid Hill, the Tadodaho of the Haudenosaunee (Iroquois Confederacy).

The Onondaga Nation, one of the six nations of the Haudenosaunee, is one of the few Native nations in North America that has retained its traditional government and language, and a portion of its ancestral lands. The film follows Onondaga Nation leaders as they continue the efforts of their ancestors to protect their sovereignty and culture, seek justice for the wrongs done to their traditional lands, and work to prevent further harm. It is a snapshot of the modern lives of the indigenous peoples that live surrounded by New York State and the echoes of the past that still reverberate today.



The Nighthawks inhabit the soul of blues music. Founded in Washington, D.C., more than 40 years ago by Little Walter-disciple Mark Wenner and guitar wizard Jimmy Thackery, the band thrives on its direct link to the great blues masters, having played with legends such as Muddy Waters, B.B. King, Gregg Allman, Pinetop Perkins, James Cotton, and John Lee Hooker. The film celebrates the band's joyous blues music and its deep roots in Washington, D.C., while spelling out the struggles of keeping a band afloat for more than four decades. Scheming record producers, weary days on the road, the changing fortunes of the blues, and conflict in the band threaten to sink the band. But The Nighthawks soldier on, carrying the torch of the blues into the 21st century. Featuring original interviews with blues legends, critics, and Nighthawks past and present, the film is the first of its kind about this band with a national and international reputation. It also features rare archival film,



photographs, and music, as well as behind-the-scenes footage and newly shot live performances in venues across the country.

Michael Streissguth is a writer and producer, known for his earlier films Johnny Cash at Folsom Prison (2008) and Record Paradise: The Musical Life of Joe Lee (2012). He teaches classes in Mass Media, Film, Writing, and English Literature at Le Moyne College.

Sometimes the most important answers lie where the childhood memories clash with the disclosure and acceptance of oneself. Tangled up in his own self, Arshak is looking for the answers in his childhood memories. He's as close to the self-acceptance as to the running in circles. What will he choose? And how will the memories from the '90s define his life?

This story is about a journalist who has entered into a professional conflict with the fawning and submissive administration of the TV channel for which he works. Left without a job, he's seized by the feeling of powerlessness and the sense of guilt before his family. His wife's a continuous persuasions to emigrate urge him to make a final decision. Such decision is not an easy one, so he has to confront his own ego; principles he's been guided by throughout his life are ruined, and the future is vague and uncertain. Feeling a strong desire to see his father, he goes to a frontier village where his father lives. On the way to his paternal home he recounts his childhood memories of hard times during the early '90s, when Armenia was at war. Confrontation with his own past helps him to regain himself and make the right decision.

Bari Luys is Ms. Arevshatyan's first feature. She had previously made several short fiction and documentary films, plus the animated, *The Fly* (2013).

ALOFT (2015) by CLAUDIA LLOSA,

112 minutes (Spain, Canada, France)

As we follow a mother (Jennifer Connelly) and her son (Cillian Murphy), we delve into a past marred by an accident that tears them apart. She will become a renowned artist and healer, and he will grow into his own as a peculiar falconer who bears the marks of a double absence. In the present, a young journalist (Mélanie Laurent) will bring about an encounter between the two that puts the very meaning of life and art into question, so that we may contemplate the possibility of living life to its fullest, despite the uncertainties littering our paths.

This Jennifer Connelly starrer written and directed by Peruvian filmmaker Claudia Llosa isn't very plotty, and the little dialogue it does dispense is shrouded in ambiguity. But something sinister is clearly afoot, and the wide-open spaces in the narrative only make us lean in closer. And when reveals occur and showdowns ensue, jump back. Set in remote Canada, ALOFT toggles between two timelines, alternately portraying the central characters, both today and 20 years ago, in a virtual jigsaw puzzle across time. As with her former film, The Milk of Sorrow, Llosa borrows heavily from Andean Indian mysticism, which maintains that the past and the present don't exist in a linear relationship, but rather like two points on a Möbius strip.

The plot centers on Connelly's character, Nana, a mother of two, whose youngest son, Gully, is terminally ill. When she brings him to a spiritual healer, her accidental touch of another sick child triggers her own journey into guru-dom, where she's sought out by the desperate and incurable, far and wide, including Jannia (Mélanie Laurent). Would Jannia have made the trip if she knew Nana was incapable of keeping her own house clean? How about if she knew Nana abandoned her house altogether—including her healthy son, Ivan, after Gully's tragic event in a frozen lake?



Winner of the Warsaw International Film Festival, *Autism In Love* shows that while finding love can be hard enough for anyone, for those with an autism spectrum disorder, the challenges may seem overwhelming.

Regardless of this disorder's origin, what is seldom found are stories about what happens once children who have been diagnosed grow up; what happens after the sleepless nights, years of therapies, special schooling, and exhaustive treatments? What happens when children with autism become adults with autism and want to have lives of their own? Unfortunately, when it comes to romantic relationships, people with autism have a distinct disadvantage. Being plagued by this developmental disorder jeopardizes the core characteristics of a relationship—communication and social interaction. Ostensibly it seems that some may never truly experience romantic love, or at least love by a typical definition. However, we know this to be false. We have innumerable instances of people with autism falling in love and having meaningful romantic relationships. Autism In Love has captured those yet unexplored experiences. The film offers a warm and stereotype-shattering look at four people as they pursue and manage romantic relationships. We've harnessed the power of cinema to reveal the truths of this otherwise marginalized community, and we're presenting a personal and critical perspective on the most important aspect of the human condition.


MILES AHEAD (2015) by DON CHEADLE,

120 minutes (USA) with producer **VINCE WILBURN**

In the midst of a prolific career, Miles Davis (Don Cheadle) disappears from public view for a period of five years in the late 1970s. He lives in isolation while dealing with chronic pain from a deteriorating hip, a musical voice inhibited and numbed by drugs and painkillers, and traumatic memories of his past. A music reporter, Dave Braden (Ewan McGregor), forces his way into Davis's house and, over the next couple of days, the two men unwittingly embark on an adventure to recover a stolen tape recording of the musician's most recent compositions.

Davis's mercurial behavior is fueled by memories of his failed marriage to the talented and beautiful dancer Frances Taylor (Emayatzy Corinealdi). During their romance and subsequent marriage, Frances served as Davis's muse. It was during this period that he released several of his signature recordings, including (Sketches of Spain) (1960) and "Someday My Prince Will Come" (1961). The eight-year marriage was marked by infidelity and abuse, however, and Frances was forced to flee for her own safety as Miles's mental and physical health deteriorated. By the late 1970s, plagued by years of regret and loss, Davis flirts with self-destruction until he once again finds redemption in his music.

Nominated for more than 90 awards and winner of over 30. Don Cheadle was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Actor for his performance in *Hotel Rwanda*. His other credits include the television series *House of Lies*, the films *Crash*, *Traitor*, *Iron Man 2*, *Ocean's Twelve*, and *Talk to Me*, among others.







A modern day Band of Brothers, Citizen Soldier set in one of the most dangerous parts of Afghanistan at the height of the surge, is a heart-pounding, heartfelt grunts-eye view of the war.


The film tells the true story of a group of young men and their life-changing tour of duty in Afghanistan. It gives the audience an intimate view into the chaos and horrors of combat as well as the bravery and valor these Citizen Soldiers display under the most hellish of conditions. The film further highlights the extraordinary and unprecedented role that the National Guard has played in post-9/11 wars since September 2001.

These Citizen Soldiers are patriotic men and women, one day working 9-to-5 jobs, the next day deploying to the front lines of war. One of them is Sgt. Eran Harrill, a born leader, devoted single father, and head of his local Chamber of Commerce. Eran is also a college student. However, when his unit is called up, he defers his education and instead deploys and fights for his country. Using multiple cameras, Eran and his fellow soldiers capture the daily life of their unit, a unit that encountered some of the most violent fighting of the war. Citizen Soldier offers an excruciatingly personal look into combat, brotherhood, and patriotism.



Lydia is in anguish over her breakup with Frank. Haunted, sleepless, and desperate, she agrees to a blind date set up by a friend. The man she meets, a handsome actor, is used to having women fall in love with him. Attracted by his intelligence and naive gamesmanship, Lydia enters into a deadly serious bargain with the actor: he will try to make her fall in love with him, and she will do whatever he asks. As they perform the actions of two people in love, they are entangled in the dynamics of frustrated desire.

The Exchange is an homage to dialogue-driven French films in the tradition of Jean Eustache, Eric Rohmer, and Maurice Pialat. Written by an American, Cynthia Mitchell, the screenplay was first translated into French and directed for the stage by Rachel Krief. After its run on the stage in Paris, Krief, Mitchell, and American producer/director Robert Arnold decided to collaborate on this film adaptation, which was shot in Paris and Normandy. The film is about the relation between love and performance, on and off stage.

Sundance Grand Jury Prize nominee Filly Brown is an inspiring and gritty portrait of a young artist striving to find her voice and seize her dreams without compromise. Majo Tonorio, a.k.a. Filly Brown, is a young, raw hip-hop artist from Los Angeles who spits rhymes from the heart. With a mother in prison and a father struggling to provide for his daughters, Majo knows that a record contract could be her family's ticket out. But when a record producer offers her a shot at stardom, she is suddenly faced with the prospect of losing who she is as an artist, as well as the friends who helped her reach the cusp of success. Directed by Youssef Delara and Michael Olmos, Filly Brown is propelled by an exceptional cast featuring Lou Diamond Phillips, Edward James Olmos, and the legendary Jenni Rivera in her final on-screen performance. Fueled by a fierce hip-hop score, Filly Brown heralds the arrival of Gina Rodriguez in the electrifying title role.

Rodriguez is a natural rapper with a strong voice, and she displays remarkable ease on camera. Phillips is wisely understated as her noble but flawed father. Olmos brings a lived-in ease to his lawyer role. Majo's musical colleague and possible romantic interest, DJ Santa (Braxton Millz), is another winning presence.







ALMOST SUNRISE (2016) by MICHAEL COLLINS,

110 minutes (USA)

Michael Collins will be leading a discussion after the screening.

Syracuse University Alumnus Michael Collins's film depicts the emotional agony and self-destructive aftermath of moral injury and follows two sufferers along a path that alleviates their psychic distress and offers hope for eventual recovery. Moral injury has some of the symptoms of PTSD, especially anger, depression, anxiety, nightmares, insomnia, and self-medication with drugs or alcohol. And it may benefit from some of the same treatments. But moral injury has an added burden of guilt, grief, shame, regret, sorrow, and alienation that requires a very different approach to reach the core of a sufferer's psyche. The film features two very troubled veterans of the war in Iraq, Tom Voss and Anthony Anderson, who decide to walk from Milwaukee to Los Angeles -2,700 miles taking $155\,$ days - to help them heal from the combat experiences that haunt them and threaten to destroy their most valued relationships.

Early on in Michael Collins's documentary about two Iraq War veterans dealing with PTSD, we're informed that 22 U.S. veterans commit suicide every day, a number greater than those who die in combat. And the saddest thing about the statistic is that it's not surprising. Exploring the ramifications of that tragic state of affairs while introducing a concept dubbed "Moral Injury," Almost Sunrise makes for powerful viewing. Recently showcased at NYC's Human Rights Watch Film Festival, it should find a welcome reception on the theatrical documentary circuit before airing on PBS next year.

Dave Bald Eagle, Christopher Sweeney, Richard Ray Whitman, Roseanne Supernault, Tatanka Means, Zahn McClarnon, and Harlen Standing Bear are the feature and supporting actors in the film, which is based on Kent Nerburn's book *Neither Wolf Nor Dog (On Forgotten Roads with an Indian Elder)*. Nerburn's trilogy of novels (the other two titles are *The Wolf at Twilight* and *The Girl Who Sang to the Buffalo*) is loved by Natives and non-Natives alike, has won awards, and is being taught in schools and colleges. The book and film are based in Pine Ridge, S.D., circa 1994. The new trailer gives us more of the storyline: how Dan (Dave Bald Eagle's character) has called on the writer Kent Nerburn (played by Christopher Sweeney) to write down his stories before he passes away, while those who surround Dan the Elder are very protective of him.



Dan is played by 97-year-old Chief Dave Bald Eagle in a wonderfully honest, no-frills way that only such an elderly semi-professional actor could achieve. Among the many awards recognizing *Captain Fantastic* are those of the Cannes Film Festival, Karlovy Vary International Film Festival, Palm Springs International Film Festival, and Seattle International Film Festival.

In the forests of the Pacific Northwest, Ben Cash raises his six children off the grid by himself after his wife was hospitalized for bipolar disorder. When Ben receives notice that his wife has killed herself, he takes his children on a road trip to New Mexico to attend their mother's funeral, despite warnings that his father-in-law will have him arrested if he disrupts the ceremony. Events surrounding the funeral, including one of his children being severely injured, one of them wishing to go to college, and one of them siding with his father-in-law, force Ben to reevaluate his choices regarding his children's upbringing and education.

"Captain Fantastic" is...well...fantastic, to say the least. The greatness of this film hinges solely on the fabulous work of main star Viggo Mortensen.... Mortensen is absolutely show-stopping as the naturalist father who must travel with his six children to their mother's funeral after her suicide. The sheer emotional range displayed and demanded of from Mortensen is enough for awards recognition as is, but it's his heart and ability to be hated that also resonates clearly with the audience.

HONORING EUGENE CORR: GHOST TOWN TO HAVANA


GHOST TOWN TO HAVANA (2015) by **EUGENE CORR**, 86 minutes (USA/CUBA)

EUGENE CORR is this year's recipient of the Bassel Shehade Award for Social Justice, sponsored by Laila and Edward Audi in memory of Bassel Shehade. Bassel was a Syracuse University graduate film student from Syria, killed on May 28, 2012 while documenting and teaching civilian videographers to record the events occurring in their country for the world to see.

Ghost Town To Havana is a film about baseball. Two teams. Two countries. One game. A life-rampant, street-level story of mentorship and ordinary, everyday heroism in tough circumstances. An inner city coach's son, estranged in his youth from his father, spends five years on ball fields in inner-city Oakland and Havana, following the lives of two extraordinary youth baseball coaches: Nicolas Reyes, a 61-yearold Afro-Cuban who coaches in a Havana neighborhood that is rich in community but struggling desperately economically, and Roscoe Bryant, a 46-year-old African-American man who coaches in a troubled Oakland neighborhood wracked by three decades of gang violence. The filmmaker introduces the coaches on videotape, and Coach Roscoe vows he will take his players to Cuba to play Nicolas's team one day. Two years of US/Cuba sanctions and red tape later, Coach Roscoe and nine players fly to Havana to play Coach Nicolas's team. For the next week, the boys and coaches eat, dance, swim, argue, tease, and play baseball together. The wary, street-smart, Ghost Town boys gradually warm to the fun-loving friendship of their Afro-Cuban hosts. Baseball! Girls! Fun! Real friendships form. Then Roscoe receives a fateful phone call from home. Right fielder Chris Fletcher's stepfather has been murdered on an Oakland street. Ghost Town to Havana is contemporary in content but as old as the Greeks thematically: the human struggle to wrest life from death.

Producer/Director Corr has broad experience in both fiction and non-fiction filmmaking. He wrote and co-directed the documentary *Waldo Salt: A Screenwriters Journey,* for which he was nominated for an Academy Award in 1991. He also wrote and directed the dramatic feature film *Desert Bloom* (Jon Voight, AnnaBeth Gish) in 1986 (Selection Officelle, Cannes Film Festival).









A VETERAN'S STORY (2016) by DAVID GANDINO, 26 minutes (USA), documentary

APOLINAIRE A STAVELOT (2016) by **Paolo Zagaglia,** 52 minutes (Belgium), documentary/fiction, (Jury Prize, San Gio Verona Video Festival)

Between documentary and fiction, the film explores the unique history of Guillaume Apollinaire, the great French poet who stayed in Stavelot in the Belgium Ardennes in the summer of 1899. We become aware of this stay only in 1934, 16 years after his death. His time in Stavelot had an immense influence on his literary work.

NOTHING ESCAPES MY EYES (2014), by **DAVID KRIPPENDORFF**, 14 minutes (Egypt/Germany), drama (winner of the 2016 San Gio Verona Video Festival)

Inspired by the famous opera *Aida* by Giuseppe Verdi, the film depicts in a metaphoric way current issues of cultural identity, loss, and the pressures to conform. *Aida* premiered in Cairo in 1871 at the Khedivial Opera House. One hundred years later, the building was completely destroyed by fire. In its place a big parking garage was built—nevertheless to this day the place is still named Opera Square: Meidan el-Opera.



QUENOTTES (2015) by **PASCAL THIEBAUX** and **GIL PINHEITO**, 12 minutes (Luxembourg/France), drama

Quenottes (Pearlies) is a story about a little mouse, but not just any mouse. It is THE little mouse, or tooth fairy, of your childhood. The one that brought you your first coin in exchange for the tooth under your pillow. In everybody's mind, the little mouse is a benevolent and generous character. What if it isn't? What if it is actually a neurotic psychopath obsessing about its collection of dental trophies? If a tooth is missing, it simply must be replaced. By any means necessary.

CARTEL LAND

CARTEL LAND (2015) by **MATTHEW HEINEMAN**, 100 minutes (USA)

This Academy Award nominee is a riveting, on-the-ground look at the journeys of two modern-day vigilante groups and their shared enemy—the murderous Mexican drug cartels. In the Mexican state of Michoacán, Dr. Jose Mireles, a small-town physician known as "El Doctor," leads the Autodefensas, a citizen uprising against the violent Knights Templar drug cartel that has wreaked havoc on the region for years. Meanwhile, in Arizona's Altar Valley—a narrow, 52-mile-long desert corridor known as Cocaine Alley—Tim "Nailer" Foley, an American veteran, heads a small paramilitary group called Arizona Border Recon, whose goal is to stop Mexico's drug wars from seeping across our border. Filmmaker Matthew Heineman embeds himself in the heart of darkness as Nailer, El Doctor, and the cartel each vie to bring their own brand of justice to a society where institutions have failed. *Cartel Land* is a chilling, visceral meditation on the breakdown of order and the blurry line between good and evil.

The film was released theatrically nationwide by The Orchard in July 2015 and had its broadcast premiere on A&E in January 2016. Heineman won the Outstanding Directorial Achievement in Documentary Award from the Director's Guild of America for the film, as well as the Courage Under Fire Award from the International Documentary Association "in recognition of conspicuous bravery in the pursuit of truth." He was also named one of *Foreign Policy* Magazine's 100 Leading Global Thinkers of 2015. In addition, *Cartel Land* was nominated for a Gotham Award, Critics' Choice Award, and BAFTA Award for Best Documentary, and was recently presented with the 2015 Documentary Award by the prestigious George Polk Awards in Investigative Journalism.


The director Matthew Heineman has a terrific eye. And, to judge from "Cartel Land," his immersive documentary about American and Mexican vigilante groups, he also has guts and nerves of steel. Serving as the primary cinematographer, he employs a run-and-gun style for much of the movie, using a lightweight digital camera that at times lurches so dramatically that you can visualize the body attached to it. Considering that Mr. Heineman landed in a few shootouts while making this documentary, both his camera moves and its pictorial quality are striking.

Kiarostami was a mentor teacher for the International Filmmaking Academy in Bologna, Italy, and held a two-week filmmakers workshop for students in Syracuse University's College of Visual and Performing Arts Film Program. He was a friend who will be sorely missed.

While touring Tuscany, Italy, promoting his new book, English author James (William Shimell) meets French store owner Elle (Juliette Binoche), and the two hit it off, deciding to spend a free day together. They travel to a nearby town, get coffee, visit a museum, and pretend to be recently married in what turns out to be a popular wedding destination. As they get to know each other, it becomes clear there's more to their new relationship than meets the eye.

The Iranian filmmaker Abbas Kiarostami's delicious brain tickler, "Certified Copy," is an endless hall of mirrors whose reflections multiply as its story of a middle-aged couple driving through Tuscany carries them into a metaphysical labyrinth.




DEADLOCK (2016) by **Harutyun Khachatrya**, 110 minutes (Armenia)

Deadlock has won many festival awards including: Paris Film Festival, Karlovy Vary International Film Festival, Torino Film Festival, and Fribourg International Film Festival.

Deadlock is the second installment in the five-documentary film series dedicated to the Armenian diaspora by filmmaker Harutyun Khachatryan. The film's main character is a longtime friend of the director. After having obtained a green card for the United States, he leaves his homeland to search for a brighter future in the land of the free and the brave. Unfortunately, the USA is not what it pretends to be through advertisement and pop culture. A world dominated by the rule of profit constantly crushes hopes and lives. Working in a car yard and barely scraping by with the necessary to survive on a daily basis, he starts longing for his birthplace. Even though he yearns to go back to Armenia and works relentlessly and tirelessly, he cannot afford it. Deadlock is a painful musing on exile and disillusionment as well as a political inquiry into what it means to live in a capitalist country. Khachatryan's approach is a deeply humanistic one, and his sensitive observational way of filming allows the material to resonate and reverberate in all its poetic and political complexity.

Harutyun Khachatrya is general director of the Golden Apricot Yerevan International Film Festival, Meritorious Artist of the Republic of Armenia, and a film director. He has made more than a dozen documentaries two, of which, *Borders* and *Return of the Poet*, were part of previous Syracuse International Film Festivals.

LISTOPAD is a story of the spirited friendship between three teenaged boys, swept up in the "Velvet Revolution" of 1989. Petr, Jiri, and Ondrej are an unlikely trio of friends. An artist, a hockey player, and a music trader, the boys survive Communism by playing sports, drinking beer, chasing girls, and listening to underground music. But they are bound together by their common desire for freedom, and—on a cold, dark night in November—Petr, Jiri, and Ondrej join the front lines of a student demonstration in the streets of Praha. Face-to-face with the riot police, the boys are forced into a momentous decision: stand up against the Communist regime or give in to a system that has silenced their families for generations. Based upon true stories from the "Velvet Revolution," LISTOPAD is a timeless story of political and artistic courage. Seen through the eyes of Petr, Jiri, and Ondrej, LISTOPAD brings to life the exhilarating days of November 1989 when, in spite of everything and everyone arrayed against them, students, artists, and dissidents filled the streets of Praha to stand up for their hopes and dreams of freedom.


SNOW MONKEY (2015) by GEORGE GITTOES,

120 minutes (Australia/Norway/Afghanistan)

Sydney Peace Prize Winner, George Gittoes's documentary is about street kids in Jalalabad, Afghanistan. The film focuses on three gangs: the Snow Monkeys, who sell ice creams from handcarts; the Ghostbusters, who wave smoke into cars to exorcise spirits and extract small tips; and a posse of thugs headed by razor-wielding 10-year-old Steel. They're all old before their time, and Gittoes's mission is to give them back some small part of their childhood while offering a glimpse of an adult life beyond the street. Towards the end, there's shocking footage of a bomb blast, filmed by a 13-year-old Snow Monkey. That such things happen is reason to despair; that a street kid has been empowered to show them to the world is some small reason to hope.

The Australian director and war activist, winner of this year's Sydney Peace Prize, positions himself at the centre of events in *Snow Monkey*, occasionally playing around the edges of fact and fiction as the street children set about making a film of their own (a continuation, in a way, of the style of his 2007 film *Miscreants of Taliwood*, shot in the Northwest Frontier Province of Pakistan)... Although Gittoes is an award-winning artist, his film does not easily classify as an art film per se, veering more towards post-modern agitprop. The Yellow House Collective, first established in Australia in the 1970s, has an old-fashioned hippy-ish feel, as does Gittoes himself. It seems almost preposterous to find this set-up in Jalalabad, yet at the same time perfectly right that he, his wife, and their well-meaning collective are here, in the middle of the madness, in the strange twilight world of lost and found children. And doing something about it.



JAZZ ON A SUMMER'S DAY (1959) by BERT STERN and GEORGE AVAKIAN, 85 minutes (USA)

Hosted by Javon Jackson

Javon Jackson, jazz sax player and University of Hartford's Jackie McLean Institute of Jazz Chair, will host the introduction and Q&A and end this joyous Closing Festival event with a jazz performance.

Arguably the greatest concert film, set at the 1958 Newport Jazz Festival in Rhode Island, the film mixes images of water and the city with the performers and audience at the festival. It also features scenes of the 1958 America's Cup yacht races. The film is largely without dialog or narration and features performances by Jimmy Giuffre, Thelonious Monk, Sonny Stitt, Anita O'Day, Dinah Washington, Gerry Mulligan, Chuck Berry, Louis Armstrong, Jack Teagarden, and Mahalia Jackson. In 1999, the film was selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry by the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."

The photography is terrific. Mr. Stern and his lens-clicking crew have a bulging assembly of color pictures that should make any camera addict simply drool. There are wonderful shots of young jazz combos riding around Newport in veteran cars, parties on yachts, couples necking, fat guys in Bermuda shorts. The assortment of candid views is endless and embraces what must be the range of the mass descent upon Newport when the summer festival is there.

Celebrated commercial/fashion photographer Bert Stern directed the classic *Jazz on a Summer's Day,* a superb record of the 1958 Newport Jazz Festival. Shot and edited in a freeform, impressionistic manner that juxtaposes candid observations of the town and the audience with the music, the film served as a template for the style of all future concert movies.

Musical director Avakian was practically a co-director as well. He did a masterful job of weaving the disparate elements into a poetic and lyrical whole, and his work here led to a distinguished career as a Hollywood editor (*The Miracle Worker, Mickey One, Lilith*), and he would later direct a number of films, including the provocative *End of the Road* (1970) and the underrated *Cops and Robbers* (1973). In any case, the film was obviously a successful collaboration, and the result is not only an exhilarating record of some of the best musicians of all time, but also a marvelously evocative portrait of a time and place.
